

The Trussell Trust has responded to the latest data from the Households Below Average Income Survey, which measures poverty before and after housing costs.

## David McAuley, Chief Executive of The Trussell Trust, said:

"We welcome the news that, according to the latest figures published by the Department for Work and Pensions, there has been a slight fall in the number of children in relative poverty, although absolute child poverty remains flat year on year. With households in poverty remaining static overall there is clearly still much more to do. Hundreds of thousands of children are still falling into food poverty, triggered by their parents facing financial hardship. Nearly 400,000 children were given 3 days emergency food by a Trussell Trust foodbank between April 2014 and March 2015, up 70,000 from the year before.

"As we enter the school holiday period it is a particularly tough time for families and single parents. Many of the people with children we meet in foodbanks face additional pressures ranging from disability, mental health issues, family tragedy and domestic violence. They need to be supported and prevented from reaching crisis point.

"The Trussell Trust is doing more than ever before to support people in crisis. But this job cannot rest solely with charities and foodbank volunteers.

"Simple changes to the way benefits are administered, raising the minimum wage, and more employers moving to a living wage would help provide solutions to poverty that we could all get behind."
